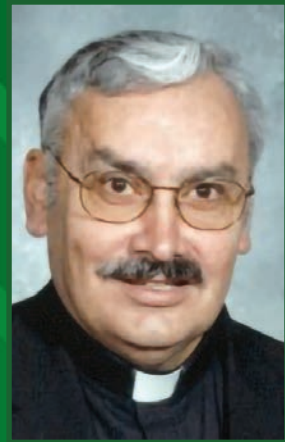

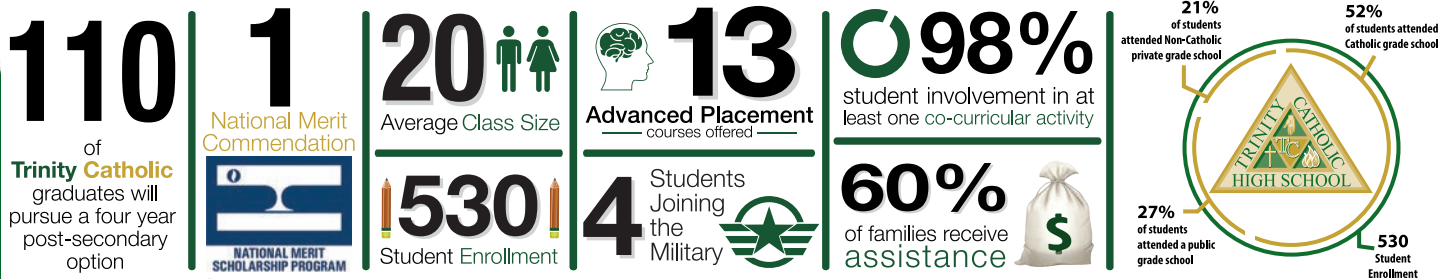

Alumni Spotlight:

Dr. Joey Sorrentino



1. You've had an incredible journey from the halls of Trinity Catholic to becoming a team captain for the Florida Gators in 2009. When you reflect on your time at Trinity, what stands out most?

What stands out most is the sense of family and community. Trinity was never just about academics or athletics—it was about shaping who we were as people. The relationships I built with teammates, coaches, classmates, and teachers created a foundation of discipline, faith, and responsibility that I've carried with me ever since.

What made Trinity unique was how tight-knit it was. You weren't just another student walking through the halls; people truly knew you, supported you, and expected the best from you. The teachers and coaches invested in us not just as athletes or students, but as young men and women learning who we wanted to become.

Those relationships stayed with me long after graduation. Many of the people who poured into me back then are still in my life today, and that continuity is something I'm incredibly grateful for.

2. What is your favorite memory from your days as a student at Trinity Catholic?

My favorite memory will always be Friday nights under the lights. Playing football for Trinity was special because we weren't just representing a school—we were representing a community. The energy, the atmosphere, the bond with my teammates, and the feeling that we were building something bigger than ourselves made those nights unforgettable.

Being part of the second graduating class at Trinity was also something unique. We went from portables to real buildings, and we got to experience a lot of "firsts" together as the school was growing. It felt like we were laying the foundation for future classes, and being part of that early chapter in TC's story is something I'll always look back on with pride.

3. Was there a teacher, coach, or staff member at TC who had a lasting impact on your life, and what did they teach you?

Coach Kerwin Bell absolutely had the biggest impact on my life at TC. He pushed me harder than I ever thought I could be pushed, but more importantly, he believed in me. From him I learned preparation, mental toughness, accountability, and that success comes from outworking everyone else—no shortcuts, no excuses. Those lessons shaped me as a college athlete, as a dentist, as a leader, and now as a father.

But it wasn't just the coaches who shaped me—TC was full of people who genuinely cared about helping us grow. One person who deserves special mention is Mrs. Dubie. So many former students still bring her up because of the incredible bonds she built with us. She had that unique ability to make every student feel seen, supported, and understood. She celebrated our wins, challenged us when we needed it, and created a sense of trust and connection that has lasted well beyond graduation.

To this day, I still talk with her and see her at TC events, and it always reminds me of how lucky we were to have adults in our lives who were truly invested in who we were becoming. My only hope is that she sticks around long enough to help keep an eye on my boys—and whoop them into shape the same way she helped shape so many of us.

I was blessed to have so many meaningful connections at TC—with teachers, administrators, and coaches who cared deeply about our character as much as our performance in the classroom or on the field. But Coach Kerwin stands out because he not only challenged me physically and mentally, he saw potential in me before I saw it in myself. He believed in me enough to help me earn a walk-on opportunity with the Gators, and that moment forever changed the trajectory of my life.

Looking back, what he taught me reinforced the values my parents raised me with—discipline, humility, faith, and doing things the right way. Like most teenagers, I didn't always recognize how right my parents were, but Coach Kerwin somehow delivered the same lessons in a way that clicked at the perfect time.

Now, my wife and I try to pass those same principles on to our four boys. Showing up. Working hard. Staying humble. Believing in something bigger than yourself. Those are the things that shaped me, and those are the things we hope will shape them, too.

4. How did being coached at Trinity by former Gator quarterback Kerwin Bell shape your athletic journey and mindset?

Being coached by Kerwin Bell at Trinity shaped my athletic journey in a way that went far beyond X's and O's. What stood out most was the standard he set—an expectation of toughness, preparation, and competing every single day. He made you believe that effort could bridge almost any gap, and that mindset became a defining part of my approach to sports and to life.

Seeing his own journey—from walk-on to starting quarterback to Gator legend—made hard work feel like more than a slogan. It was something you could model. It taught me that you don't need to be the most naturally gifted athlete to succeed, but you do need to be the one willing to put in the extra reps, study the film, and show up with the right attitude when no one's watching.

Kerwin's coaching gave me a belief that if I committed fully—physically and mentally—I could create my own opportunities. That perspective played a huge role when I got to Florida. Don't get me wrong, walking on was very intimidating but I had already learned how to embrace the underdog mindset at Trinity. The foundation of that mindset was laid at Trinity, and it pushed me to keep raising my expectations for myself at every level that came next.



5. Trinity emphasizes faith and service. How did those values influence your decision to donate your 2008 Capital One Bowl Best Buy shopping spree to area hospitals?

Faith and service at Trinity weren't just concepts—they were part of the daily culture. They were woven into how people treated each other, how teachers led their classrooms, and how coaches carried themselves. A lot of those lessons were caught, not taught. Just being in that environment, seeing people serve quietly and consistently, made it easy to understand what truly matters.

That atmosphere mirrored the example I saw every day at home. My parents lived out those same values through their actions, not just their words. As a teenager, you don't always realize how much that shapes you—but looking back, it made doing the right thing feel natural.

My little brother Anthony's journey also had a huge impact on me. When he was very young, he was treated at Shands Pediatrics for liver cancer. Watching him fight through something no kid should ever have to face gave me a different perspective on life, gratitude, and purpose. The doctors and nurses at Shands became part of our story, and that experience has stayed with me ever since.

Now, years later, Anthony is a doctor himself—he went to medical school at that same hospital and is now working at the University. His journey is a reminder of how impactful care and compassion can be.

So when the opportunity came in 2008 to donate my Best Buy shopping spree to area hospitals, it didn't feel like a grand gesture—it just felt right. It was a chance to give back to kids and families who were going through the same battles my brother faced. It was less about me and more about honoring the values I grew up with: gratitude, service, and using any blessing you're given to lift someone else up.

6. Walk-on athletes rarely become team captains—yet you did just that. What motivated you to pursue football at Florida, and how did Trinity Catholic help lay the groundwork for that achievement?

At Trinity, we were taught never to shy away from challenges—especially the ones that seemed out of reach. That environment shaped me early, because it gave me chances to rely on work ethic over natural ability. I learned that if I was willing to prepare harder, compete longer, and stay disciplined, I could close the gap on anyone. That mindset became one of the biggest reasons I pursued the dream of playing football at Florida.

Coach Kerwin played a huge role as well. He opened the door for me and gave me the opportunity to prove myself when others might not have taken that chance. His belief in me built a confidence that I carried with me into Gainesville. I've always loved the game of football, but I've also loved being the underdog—hearing what I can't do and then outworking people until I change the narrative.

Walking on at Florida wasn't about being the most talented guy on the field; it was about competing with purpose every single day. Trinity gave me an early blueprint for that—showing up, doing the hard things, and pushing through when excuses would have been easier.

Becoming a team captain at Florida came from that same underdog mentality: prove people wrong, elevate the standard, and commit to outworking everyone around you. Trinity laid the groundwork for that long before I stepped into The Swamp.

7. What lessons did you learn as a Florida Gators team captain that you carry with you in your career and everyday life?

One of the greatest lessons I learned as a Florida Gators team captain is that leadership is ultimately about making the people around you better. I was never the loudest voice in the room, but I always prided myself on leading by example—working hard whether anyone was watching or not. Being captain taught me that leadership isn't about a title on your chest; it's about setting the tone, lifting others up, and holding yourself and your team to a standard every single day.

I learned that you can't ask someone else to do something you aren't willing to do yourself. Whether it was running scout team, preparing relentlessly for the next opponent, or sprinting down the field on kickoff against a big rival, I believed my job was to show up with total effort and commitment. That approach earned respect far more than any speech ever could.

At the risk of sounding like a broken record, work ethic is what separates the good from the great. That belief has carried into every chapter of my life—dentistry, leading a business, and especially being a father. If you asked my boys what Dad is always reminding them of, they'd probably roll their eyes and say, "Work hard and never give up." It's the one non-negotiable in our house, because it's the one thing you can always control.

What I learned at Florida was that real leadership starts with how you carry yourself, and that lesson still guides me every day.

8. What inspired you to pursue dentistry, and how did your discipline as a student-athlete influence your path in the medical field?

Early on, I thought I might go into medicine. My dad loves to joke that out of his three sons, he ended up with two doctors and a dentist—and every time he says it, he delivers it with a smirk to keep me humble. But as I explored different paths, I had the opportunity to shadow some incredible local dentists who really shaped my perspective. Through them, I realized dentistry offered the perfect blend of what I loved about medicine while also fulfilling my entrepreneurial side. It allowed me to build something of my own, lead a team, and still be present for my family. Looking back, it was a decision rooted in both passion and practicality—and after more than 10 years in the field, I truly can't imagine doing anything else.

Helping people and being part of their journey never gets old.

The discipline I developed as a student-athlete played a huge role in that path. Balancing academics, training, film study, and leadership responsibilities taught me how to manage time, handle pressure, and stay focused on long-term goals. Running a dental practice is built on those same principles: preparation, teamwork, resilience, and consistency over time.

And just like at UF, I've learned that **you're only as good as the people around you**. I'm blessed with an incredible team at work and an equally strong support system at home. My work family, my parents and in-laws, and of course my wife—none of this would be possible without them. Their support allows me to give my best in every role I play.

9. Today, you serve on Trinity Catholic's Board of Directors and have an award named in your honor. What does that continued connection to TC mean to you?

Trinity shaped who I am, so being able to give back now is both humbling and incredibly rewarding. I've always been grateful for everything TC poured into me—the relationships, the discipline, the values, and the doors that opened because of my time there. But now, having four sons of our own, the lens through which I see everything has completely changed. I'm no longer just reflecting on what Trinity meant to me—I'm thinking about what it will mean for them.

That perspective has energized me and motivated me to stay involved in the TCHS community. I want to help build a school culture that is strong, faith-driven, disciplined, and supportive—the kind of place where my boys, and every student, can grow into the best version of themselves. Being able to contribute to that vision feels like coming full circle.

Having an award named after me is an honor that still doesn't feel real. It's something I don't take lightly. My hope is that it inspires students—especially my own sons—not to focus on things they can't control, but to invest fully in the things they can: their effort, their attitude, and their integrity. Those three things, lived out consistently, can shape an incredible life. They're the same principles that carried me from Trinity to the University of Florida, into my career, and through the blessings and challenges of adulthood.

If this award motivates even one student to work harder, treat people better, keep their faith strong, and believe that their path has purpose, then it will mean more than any recognition with my name on it ever could.

10. What do you hope the recipient of the Dr. Joey Sorrentino Award takes away from that recognition?

I hope the recipient understands that this award is ultimately about character. It's not just about what you accomplish on the field, in the classroom, or how many accolades you collect—it's about who you are when no one is watching. The qualities that matter most are integrity, resilience, humility, faith, and a willingness to serve others. Those traits will take them far beyond high school athletics. In fact, they will carry them further in life than talent alone ever could.

I also hope they realize what this recognition represents: consistency. Showing up every day. Doing the little things right. Treating people well. Pushing through when adversity hits. Being the kind of teammate—and the kind of person—others can count on. Those are the habits that build a meaningful life, no matter what path they choose.

More than anything, I hope the award inspires the recipient to believe in themselves and the power of their own effort. If they embrace those values now, the opportunities ahead of them will be far greater than they can even imagine today. **Ultimately if you work hard, never give up, and consistently do things the right way, life has a funny way of working out in your favor.**

11. Trinity Catholic is committed to forming faith-filled leaders. What advice would you give to today's Celtics looking to chase big dreams—on or off the field?

It's easy for all of us—especially when we're young—to become laser-focused on ourselves, our circumstances, and whatever challenge is right in front of us. But if you can learn to step back and remember that you're a small part of a much bigger story, it changes everything. As cliché as it sounds, God truly does have a plan for each of us. Your job isn't to control every outcome—it's to be faithful with the opportunities you're given.

Dream big, but don't let your dreams stay abstract. **Pair them with work ethic, discipline, and prayer.** Don't be afraid to fail. Failure isn't final unless you quit; more often, it becomes the fuel that pushes you toward who you're meant to be.

Surround yourself with people who challenge you, sharpen you, and make you better. Choose friends who hold you accountable, not those who pull you away from your purpose. And whatever path you take—sports, academics, career—keep service at the center of your life. If your dreams only elevate you, they're too small.

Tim Tebow often talks about this idea in different ways:

"Success isn't about what you accomplish; it's about the impact you make on the lives of others."

That truth applies whether you're on a field, in a classroom, or decades into your career.

So my advice is simple:

Work hard. Stay humble. Trust God. Serve others.



If you do those four things consistently, there is no dream too big and no setback strong enough to stop you from becoming the person you're called to be.

12. If you could go back and speak to your high school self at Trinity, what would you say?

Drop the ego. Don't be scared to fail. That's one of the biggest lessons I wish every young person could truly understand. Even now, there are moments when I hesitate to try something because I'm afraid it won't work out. But I've learned over time that failure isn't the end—it's *information*. It's a piece of data you get to carry with you. And the next time you face something similar, you're stronger, wiser, and more prepared because of it.

For a long time, I was more worried about what other people might think if I didn't succeed. But the older you get, the clearer it becomes: the worst feeling in the world isn't failure—it's regret. It's looking back and thinking, "I wish I would have tried." So take the chances. Bet on yourself. Push through the fear. Because the truth is, when you do, your life will become more than you ever dreamed of.

I'm living proof of that. The same "never give up" mentality I carried into football was the same approach I had to take in chasing my wife—who definitely turned me down more than once before our first date. Persistence pays off, and God clearly knew what He was doing, because she has been the greatest blessing of my life. She's the rock of our family, and together we've been blessed with four incredible boys who fill our home—and our hearts—with more joy and purpose than I ever imagined possible.

If there's one thing I want students to know, it's this: **your story can grow into something far greater than the dream you have right now.** Keep your faith strong. Give your best effort. Stay humble. Don't let fear stop you. And surround yourself with people who lift you up—whether it's teammates, friends, mentors, or, one day, a spouse who believes in you even when the world doesn't.

Take the shot. Take the chance. Say yes to the hard things. If you do, you'll find that God's plan for your life is bigger, richer, and more meaningful than anything you could've written on your own.



Celtic Institute of Agriscience

The Celtic Institute of Agriscience continues to advance Trinity Catholic's commitment to providing meaningful, hands-on educational experiences that highlight the essential role agriculture plays in our daily lives. Students visit the campus land lab multiple times each week, engaging in practical learning that strengthens their understanding of agricultural sciences and environmental stewardship.

Since its founding in 2019, the program has grown steadily through the support of Trinity Catholic Administration and the TC FFA Alumni. A major milestone was achieved in 2023 with the construction of a new barn, expanding the land lab's capacity and enhancing opportunities for student engagement. Today, the facility houses a variety of animals and serves as a gathering place for popular community-building events, including FFA breakfasts and the Homecoming S'mores celebration.

This fall, Trinity Catholic will host the 3rd Annual TC Ag Day, an event designed to introduce students to the wide range of agricultural industries and commodities that define Marion County. The 2025 Trinity Catholic FFA chapter included 72 active participants who collectively submitted more than 100 entries to the Southeastern Youth Fair. Students showcased their talents in livestock judging, tractor driving, photography, sewing, BBQ, and insect collection, while also exhibiting chickens, rabbits, lambs, goats, heifers, horses, steers, and swine.

Through these experiences, the Celtic Institute of Agriscience continues to cultivate leadership, responsibility, and a deep appreciation for agriculture, strengthening both our program and our community year after year.





Fine Arts



The Trinity Catholic Band program continues to demonstrate outstanding growth, talent, and achievement across all levels. This year, the program included 55 student musicians, with 18 new members joining the ensemble. Our students continue to excel both on campus and beyond, with six seniors pursuing music at the collegiate level and several earning scholarship support.

The band earned Superior ratings at Marching MPA and Straight Superior ratings at both Jazz and Concert MPA, reflecting the program's commitment to excellence. 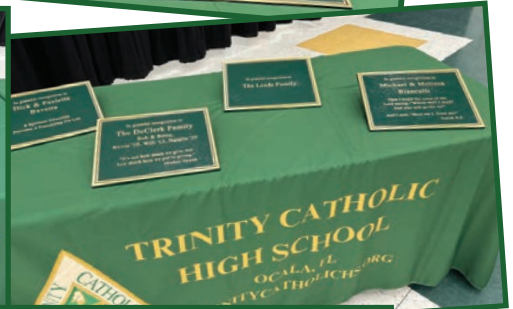

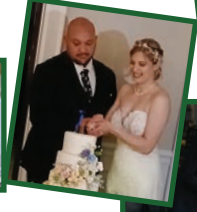
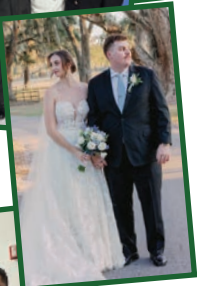
